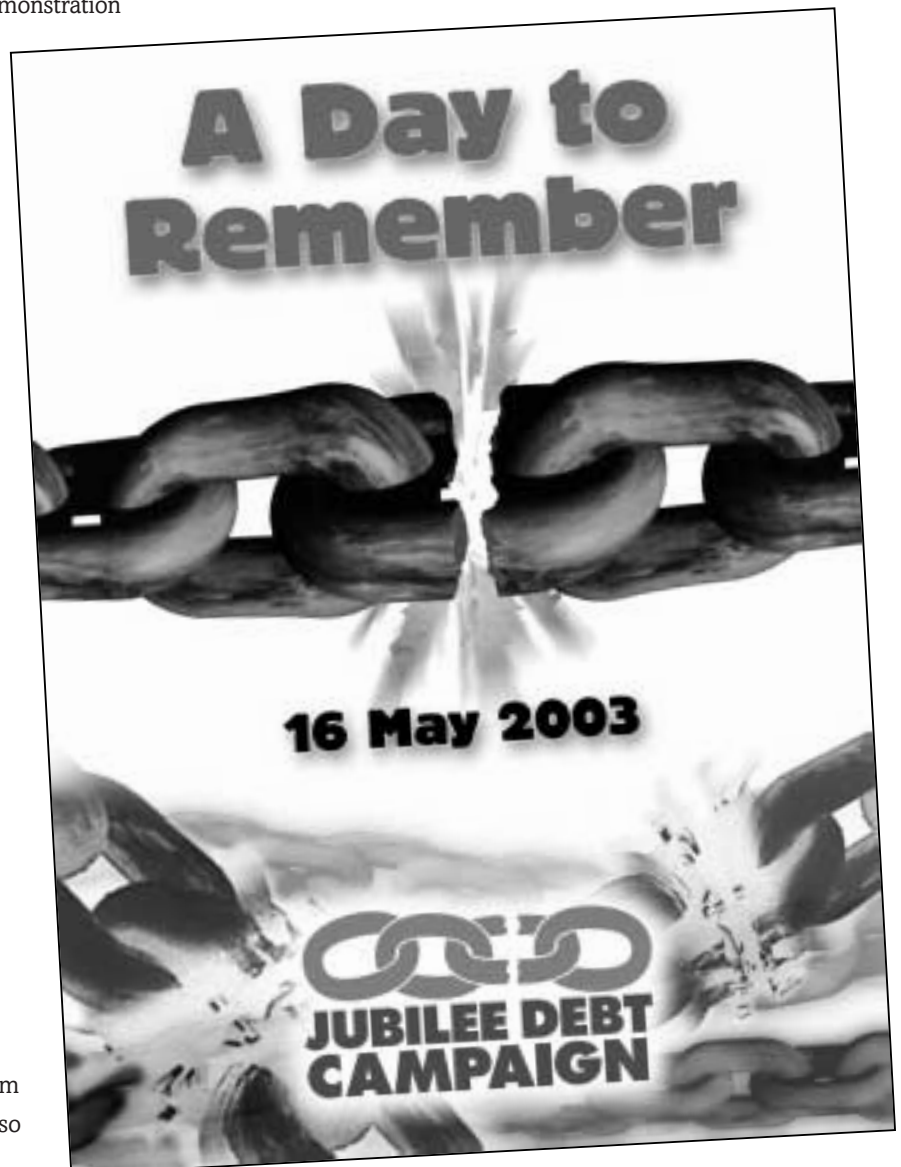

## 129,000 sign Queen's petition

The ducks and pelicans waddled around unconcerned as we wandered through St James' Park on our way from Mary Sumner House to the gates of Buckingham Palace. Among us were representatives from the Commonwealth, colourful in national dress and bearing their national flags. Someone was teaching an African hymn, so we sang along.

Eleven Commonwealth countries are affected by the issue of unpayable debt and it was appropriate that the Mothers Union President should lead the way with the Chairman of the Jubilee Debt Campaign. The Mothers Union are strong campaigners for debt cancellation and the Queen is MU patron. We merged with the throng surrounding the palace and paused for photographs. A uniformed aide appeared and it was time to pass over the stack of boxes containing 129,000 signatures and thumbprints collected from Britain and MU women in parts of Africa.

The petition, begun during the Queen's Jubilee year, asked her to urge her ministers to 'pursue deeper and wider debt relief for

the millions of poor people in the Commonwealth and beyond who are still enslaved by unpayable debt and so make a Year of Jubilee for all.'

Before the hand-in, Martha Bodu Boateng, MU worker from Kumasi Diocese, Ghana, said, 'I signed the petition because I wanted the poorer countries of the world to be relieved of debt and poverty. If debt was relieved, I know my local community would be able to evolve. At the moment there are no jobs for our youth, and the government does not have the money to help them. We need more money for education, which the government also cannot provide for our youth, both primary and secondary education.'

Only a fraction of the cancellation promised internationally has happened and whilst this fraction has been of benefit, no less than 100% cancellation is needed, as well as a massive increase in aid, to make possible an escape from poverty for the very poorest nations.

Thanks to all of you who have set up standing orders in favour of TIDAL and others who have sent in one-off donations. This is all really encouraging. At the moment, however, it costs us around £900 per month to run and staff the office, produce newsletters and other communications, as well as to plan, organise and run educational and campaigning events. Currently, standing orders bring in around £300 per month, leaving a shortfall of around £600 a month. As a campaigning group, we can't apply for charitable status and some grants and trusts are also unavailable to us. As the successor to the Leeds Jubilee 2000 Network, TIDAL is well-respected and recognised nationally as being a standard-setting campaigning group – and our effectiveness depends largely on having a paid member of staff and a campaigns office. ## Vive la Velorution! The G8 Cyclists ride again

**At the time of going to press... five or six from Scotland, three or four from Lancashire, and five or six from Leeds hope to all meet up in Zeebrugge on 22 May. We have a civic welcome lined up in Lille that night, and then pass through Reims, Dijon and various smaller places (with campsites) before arriving, we hope, just south of Geneva (Annemasse) on 29 May. Somewhere between here and Sciez there will be some kind of alternative conference before the Summit on 1 June.**

**Unlike two years ago, I have had several emails from France expressing interest in our trip. It looks like we'll get a welcome in Reims and Dijon, and there's another group who want to keep in touch**

**with us as we cross France. Foolishly, they have expressed interest in our performance of *Le Marchand de Venise*, so it looks like we'll get a chance to perform on the way, as well as when we arrive. We'll also be taking leaflets to hand out on the way.**

**There are a number of events being planned in France already. Many of them seem more concerned with the War than with Debt or Trade. And many see no good in the G8 at all. Maybe there'll be violence? We'll do what we can to focus on the TIDAL issues.**

**'Vive la Velorution'? Someone used the words in their email to me. Good, eh? I think I'll get it put on a T-shirt.**

# Scale up for Trade Justice!

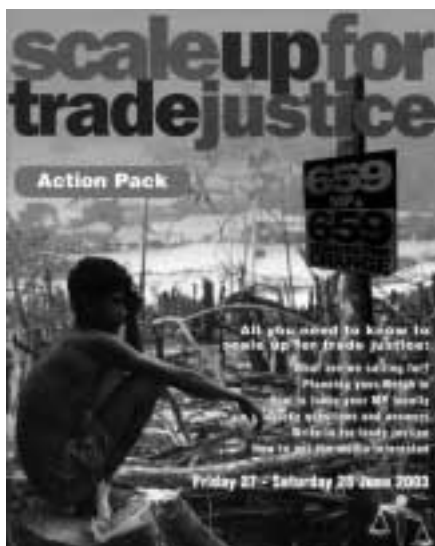
World trade rules rob poor countries of £1.3 billion a day – 14 times what they get in aid. This needs to change. And this year we have a chance to change it. September sees the next big meeting of the World Trade Organisation, due to take place in Mexico. It's vital that the agreements made in Mexico swing the balance in favour of the poorest people and the environment. That's why we're scaling up our efforts now.

## 24 Hours for Trade Justice!

Last year, trade justice campaigners lobbied over half the UK's MPs in Westminster. This year, we're taking the campaign to where MPs hear it most – in their own towns and cities. The aim is to lobby every one of the 659 MPs over a 24 hour period from noon on Friday 27 June until noon on Saturday, when people all over the county will hold scales in the air and shout 'Weigh in for Trade Justice!'

## The Leeds Lobby

TIDAL is organising a 'Leeds Lobby', bringing Leeds MPs into the centre of the city to meet with and be lobbied by you, their constituents, in Millennium Square. By coming together in this way, we can demonstrate the strength of feeling on this issue in Leeds, maximise the opportunity to get noticed by the public and press, and also have even more fun!



The programme of the day so far is as follows:

**10:30am** Speaker event, Leeds Civic Hall – come and be inspired about the campaign for trade justice.

**11:15am** Congregate in Millennium Square in preparation for the lobby

**11:30am** Lobbying of Leeds MPs

**12.00 noon** Weigh in for Trade Justice! The mass moment with scales so bring some along – kitchen scales, bathroom scales, cardboard cut-out scales – the more eye-catching the better!

## What can you do?

**ACTION**

■ Put 28 June in your diary and spread the word about the Leeds Lobby!

■ Let us know if you're coming, and who your MP is.

■ If you are part of a group (youth group, faith group, etc) think about how you can get as many people involved as possible (eg: hold scales and banner-making workshops).

■ So far the following MPs have confirmed they will be at the Leeds Lobby: John Battle (Leeds West), Colin Challen (Morley & Rothwell), Fabian Hamilton (Leeds North East), Paul Truswell (Pudsey). If your MP is not listed, then contact them, asking them to come along. They have all been written to already but some may need

extra encouragement! (Find the name of your MP at [www.locata.co.uk/commons](http://www.locata.co.uk/commons) or ring 020 7219 4272.)

■ In addition to the Leeds Lobby, you may also wish to arrange a meeting with your MP in his constituency on Friday 27 June – contact your MP as quickly as possible about this.

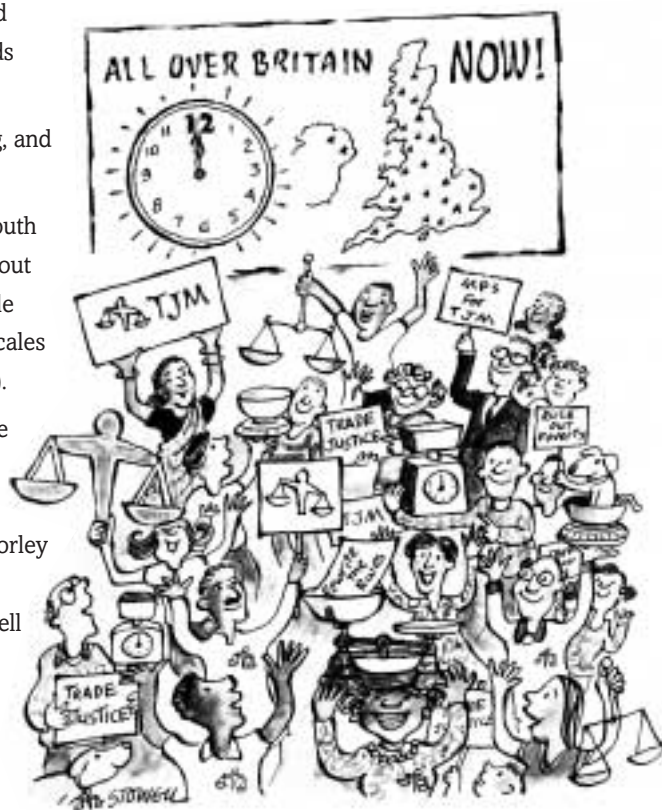
■ We aim to bombard MPs with letters between now and the WTO meeting, so start writing!

## '800 a day' for Arup

## Schools go loco for cocoa!

Carr Manor Primary and Parklands Girls High School both hosted Fairtrade cocoa producers during Fairtrade Fortnight. Comfort, a Ghanaian cocoa farmer and Rijayatu, a 14 year old daughter of a cocoa farmer, visited the schools with two representatives from the Day Chocolate Company, who produce Divine and Dubble bars. Comfort and Rijayatu explained the hard work that goes into looking after cocoa plants, and about the process that the cocoa beans go through before they are shipped to Europe and made into chocolate. Carr Manor pupils learnt about the games that Rijayatu plays on her farm, and about the pets she owns. Comfort taught the pupils how to say 'best of the best' in Twi (their local language) and

showed pupils the rugby-ball-shaped pod the cocoa beans grow in.

The girls at Parklands were roughly the same age as Rijayatu but were initially shy about asking her any questions. However, they were soon exchanging information about what their days were like, how their schools compared, and if Rijayatu had a boyfriend! The girls were very shocked to hear pupils get caned at her school for being late for classes, and that she has a lie in until 6.30am on a Saturday. The fact that Rijayatu has only been able to go to school in the last two years, since her Dad joined Kuapa Kokoo Co-operative who sell some of their cocoa, was also very interesting. All the pupils said that they enjoyed the experience and hopefully this wasn't just because they got a bar of Dubble at the end of the lesson!



Following the wonderful success of Fairtrade Fortnight, both nationally and in Leeds, and the huge interest shown by the public, the next step is to work towards **Fairtrade City status** for Leeds.

Achieving Fairtrade City status is a very effective way of promoting fairly traded goods and increasing the number of farmers in the developing world who are able to work their own way out of poverty by earning a fair price for their crops.

# Let's make Leeds a Fairtrade City!



There are already many villages, towns, and cities which have achieved Fairtrade status, including nearby Haworth. Others include: Leicester, Nottingham, Derby, Bolton and Newcastle. York is also working on it – so can we beat them to make Leeds the first Fairtrade City in Yorkshire?

## What do we need to do?

We need 20 businesses and organisations who do not yet use Fairtrade tea and coffee to agree to use them regularly. We also need four more cafés to have fairly traded drinks as an option – a few already do, but we want to increase the number.

## Can you help us?

If you know of any businesses or employers who would consider using Fairtrade tea and coffee please could you email or phone Jane at the TIDAL office.

We also need to persuade Leeds City Council to actively promote the use of Fairtrade produce (mainly tea and coffee) in all its departments and, where appropriate, in its literature. By the time you read this, the local council elections will probably be over – why not write to your newly elected / re-elected or existing councillor and let them know your views about supporting Fairtrade? Feel free to use the attached form or write your own letter.

Please let us know of any replies you receive. Thanks.

## Five Goals for a Fairtrade City from the Fairtrade Foundation...

- 1 Local council passes a resolution supporting Fairtrade, and agrees to serve Fairtrade coffee and tea at its meetings and in its offices and canteens.
- 2 A range of Fairtrade products are readily available in the area's shops and served in at least four cafés/catering establishments.
- 3 Fairtrade products are used by at least 20 businesses and organisations.

- 4 Attract media coverage and popular support for the campaign.
- 5 A local Fairtrade steering group is convened to ensure continued commitment to its Fairtrade City status.

# Fairtrade Fortnight – a major success!

Leeds Fairtrade Fortnight was a big success, with lots of opportunities to promote Fairtrade and the new Fairtrade mark with the public and supermarkets in Leeds.

During the fortnight, cocoa farmers from Ghana and a banana farmer from the Windward Islands visited local schools. On the Saturday the town crier of East Riding and Hollywood USA proclaimed the Fairtrade message in Leeds city centre, whilst a gaggle of fairies distributed over 2,000 leaflets, balloons and Fairtrade chocolate. On Monday there were some challenging questions about Fairtrade at a quiz at the Royal Park Pub, followed on Tuesday by the award for the 'Best Leeds Supermarket For Fairtrade 2003' at the Civic Hall. The last event of Fairtrade Fortnight was at the Beehive, where 'Foods from Around the World' were served throughout the day.

## Best Leeds Supermarket for Fairtrade 2003

With the help of a gang of volunteers, over 40 Leeds supermarkets were surveyed, both before and during Fairtrade Fortnight. The survey included Asda, Co-op, Morrison's,

Safeway, Sainsbury's and Tesco stores in Leeds, but not stores that do not stock any Fairtrade goods (eg: Marks and Spencer, Kwik Save, Iceland and Spar). The survey looked at the range of Fairtrade goods available and how the store promoted them.

As a result of the survey, the Co-op in Cardigan Road, Headingley was given the award of 'Best Leeds Supermarket for Fairtrade 2003'. They had an excellent range of Fairtrade products with promotional stands and offers well ahead of Fairtrade

Fortnight. Alongside the products, they also had well-designed, colourful and informative literature specifically about Fairtrade.

Co-op stores featured highly in the top ten, with even the smaller stores having a wide range of products. With the Co-op now having a large range of its own products bearing the Fairtrade Mark, it is leading the way for supermarkets.

Sainsbury's stores also featured highly in the top ten. They had the best range of Fairtrade coffees in Leeds and also good promotion and coverage in their store magazine.



Look out for the new international **Fairtrade Mark** in your local supermarket or store. It ensures the producers have had a fair deal and it can be found on over 100 products – including bananas, pineapples, mangoes, tea, coffee and chocolate.
